1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Deccan Education Society, Pune, the parent body of Brihan Maharashtra College of Commerce, is an established name in the educational arena of our country. Deccan Education Society has been rendering yeoman service to the nation for well over a period of 125 years. Ever since its inception, "Facilitating and cheapening education" has been the mission of the Society which it has been pursuing with steadfast determination and uncompromising commitment.

The Society started a College of Commerce and had the good fortune of having an eminent economist and educationist, Prof. D.G.Karve at the helm of affairs for the first six years and this indeed provided the foundation and impetus for the growth of the College, taken to greater heights in later years by a succession of eminent and visionary Principals.

BMCC has been accredited by NAAC with the celebrated "five star" accreditation status in 2004 and reaccredited by NAAC with "A" Grade in 2009. It was re-accredited in the year 2015 with "A" grade and CGPA 3.16. It has the pride of being one of the first Colleges to be conferred with the status of College with Potential for Excellence by UGC in 2004.

The College was conferred with 'Autonomous' status by the UGC from academic year 2017-18. Since, we got the academic autonomy; we revamped the curriculum to keep up with the requirements and demands of all the stakeholders. The credit structure and semester pattern was introduced with immediate effect. The institution is proud to state that during the five year period from 2017-18 to 2021-22, four new degree programmes are launched. (BMS in E-commerce operations, B.Voc in Film Making & dramatics, B.Com (Honours) and B.Com (Fintech). B.Com with International Finance and B.Com with Strategic Finance are another two integrated programmes launched. A wide range of value added and skill based courses have been introduced. Computer labs, ERP System, Intelligent Interactive Panels, Internet bandwidth etc. have helped to strengthen the IT infrastructure. Hostel facilities, Lohia Academic Complex to house many academic programmes are some of the other notable developments on the campus. Thus, the college provides conducive environment for the students all round development.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The College is privileged in several ways-

Location: The College is situated in the educational epicenter of the city of Pune surrounded by several nationally known educational institutions resulting in great synergy among the institutions, facilitating meaningful interactions. It has the advantage of natural green backdrop and a quiet ambience even though situated in the heart of the city.

Tradition: The College believes in retaining and nurturing all that is good and of lasting value in our rich tradition and culture coupled with a vibrant, invigorating atmosphere for all round development.

Autonomous Status: The College was granted autonomy from the academic year 2017-2018 by UGC and this has offered academic flexibility and opportunity to introduce new teaching learning and evaluation parameters for overall holistic development of the students. The curriculum has been enriched by inputs from industry, professional and alumni in addition to academicians within and outside the college. Continuous evaluation is done to monitor student's progress with innovative approaches.

Infrastructure: The College has excellent infra-structural facilities in terms of ICT enabled class-rooms, assembly halls, well-stocked library, staff quarters, a full-fledged sports ground with gymnasium facility, two students' hostels, common rooms for girls, meeting rooms, nine computer labs, language laboratory, commerce laboratory, accounts lab and additional academic building consisting of class rooms, offices, and Dr. Cyrus Poonawala Conference Hall and Pittie Hall for cultural department.

Faculty: A substantial number of teachers have research qualifications, have authored text books and reference books, and has published research and review articles in periodicals and journals. Another advantage is the participation of the alumni and industry professionals in teaching learning process as Faculty members or BOS members.

RUSA Grant: The College has been sanctioned grant of 2 crores by RUSA and it has been utilized for the benefit of the students.

Alumni Connect: The college has a strong alumni connect.

Placements: The college has a Placement Cell which actively looks after training, internships and placements of students.

Research: Seed money is provided to teachers for research under the D G Karve Chair.

Institutional Weakness

Limited Academic Flexibility-The present autonomous system gives flexibility to the College for curricular design and development, time frame and examination pattern, however horizontal mobility from one programme to another is still restricted.

High Student-teacher ratio- The student-teacher ratio is on the higher side.

Single Faculty College: The college is a single faculty college and hence focused more on core areas of commerce and management. In the light of the NEP, this seems to be a weakness.

Institutional Opportunity

Demand for commerce professionals-With India emerging as a Knowledge economy, professionals are in demand. Therefore, institutions offering business and commerce education play an important role.

Collaborations with Industry and other Institutions-The college has collaborations with institutes like ICAI, LSC, ACCA, US-CMA and with the growing need for practical oriented teaching learning approach, there is great opportunity for the College to establish more constructive relationships with industry and other reputed institutions in India and abroad.

E content and Distance mode of education-Rapid improvement in technology has provided great opportunity to higher educational institutions for developing E content and also distance mode of education. This can be used as a means of social outreach for remote and rural areas. The college has initiated a satellite center in Velhe Taluka.

Faculty Exchange Programs- The College is looking at avenues for faculty exchange programs in India and abroad to add to the teaching and research acumen of the faculties.

New academic programs: The College has started BVOC in Film making and Dramatics, BMS in logistics and supply chain management and BCOM Honors and BCOM Fintech and can explore similar avenues in future.

Degree Granting College: In the context of the National Education Policy, the college can introduce new programs and courses and move towards becoming a degree granting college in future.

Institutional Challenge

Consultancy-Generating Revenue through Consultancy is a challenge as the college offers consultancy as a service to the society.

Faculty Recruitment- The role of a teacher is not restricted to curriculum delivery only but it extends to facilitating the holistic development of the students. Recruitment of permanent faculty in the present scenario is a challenge.

Multi-disciplinary: With the advent of NEP, going multi-disciplinary as per the UGC and NEP guidelines is a challenge.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As a premiere institute of Commerce, BMCC is committed in its quest for academic excellence. Post Autonomy (academic) in 2017 the curriculum in courses like Entrepreneurship, Management, Accountancy, Economics and Finance, Business Mathematics and Statistics, Information Technology, International Business, Logistics, supply chain etc. has been enriched, taking into account the local, regional, national and global developments. In the first year of autonomy, all the programmes were revised with subsequent revision in a few programmes in the year 2019-20. Further, utmost care is taken to see that curriculum incorporates all the components that either directly or indirectly focus on employability/entrepreneurship and skill development.

During the last 5 years, a sizeable number of new courses have been introduced across all the degree programmes including the newly launched programmes. All these courses are either choice based or elective system based. They are designed taking into account the industry requirements. Thus, BMCC offers a very rich and comprehensive curriculum integrating themes like Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability and Professional Ethics across all degree programmes.

Besides the regular curriculum, BMCC offers a wide array of Value-added Courses in Computer/Technical skills, Soft Skills and Business Skills to ensure holistic development of the students. Internships are facilitated to students in Banks and other industries and with professionals like Chartered Accountants, Company Secretaries etc.

A structured feedback on the teachers and curriculum is taken from the students regularly. Besides, feedback from other stakeholders is also taken. Appropriate actions are taken after discussion of the feedback analysis with various statutory bodies of the college.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The average enrolment of students for the last 5 years is 96%, which follows all social reservation policies. The student demography reflects students from all socio-economic background and different states of India. A structure for identification of slow and advanced learners has been formalised. The students' needs are

identified through daily classroom interactions and participation in different activities and the students are mentored as per their requirements. The mentor mentee ratio is 1:99. The students are encouraged and guided to participate in various competitions of their interests and calibre including sports and cultural activities and in pursuing higher education in reputed institutes in India and abroad. Even though the student teacher ratio is 1:85, students are given individual attention whenever needed. There is an established system of preparation of the academic calendar and teaching plans. Most of the teachers either hold a PhD qualification or are pursing the same and their average teaching experience is 8 years. The teaching learning pedagogy is learner centric for holistic development. ICT enabled tools are used on a regular basis. The examination process is followed as per the regulations and supported by ERP system. During the last 5 years, 81% of students have passed the examinations and the average grievances is 2.51%. The COs are framed in tune with the POs by the respective faculty members and the PO/CO mapping process is formalised.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution has always created a positive atmosphere for promotion of research activities. Research facilities are frequently updated as per the latest standards and a well-defined research policy has also been laid. From time to time a substantial amount of money is provided to the teachers for research. Research grants have also been received from the Board of College and University Development, SPPU. The college is a member of INFLIBNET and N-List where students can access digital collection of journals and articles for additional learning resources and for research purposes. During the last five years, 70% of the teachers have had research projects and 30% of them are recognized research guides. The activities undertaken by all the departments of the college have created an ecosystem for innovation, creativity and transfer of knowledge. A considerable number of workshops and seminars have been conducted on Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and entrepreneurship and skills development during the last five years. The institution has a well stated code of ethics for research methodology and a plagiarism checker software as well. It even provides research methodology coursework to the research scholars. The number of Ph.D. students registered during the last five years is 73. A significant number of research papers have been published by all the teachers in UGC Care and peer reviewed journals. The college has also been involved in number of extension activities and outreach programmes through various departments like NSS, NCC, Heritage Collective, Cultural Department, Red Cross, Board of Student Development Department and Nature Club, sensitizing the students about social issues and their impact. These activities help in making them socially responsible citizens of India as well as the world and instill in them a sense of national pride. The institution even has 11 MOUs with institutions of national and international importance.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Established in 1943, BMCC is known for its spacious campus and heritage building. All classes are LAN and interactive digital panel enabled spread across three academic buildings. A 5 storied, 60,000 sq. ft building is also expected to be completed shortly. There are nine computer laboratories and three auditoriums. For all the extra-curricular activities and sports/practices, BMCC has two big playgrounds including a basketball court and a gymkhana. There is also a students' re-creation centre in the form of Pittie hall and a common room facility for girl students.

The institute has adequate infrastructure for effective teaching learning, one of them being a two storied library building established in 1973 consisting of a combination of rare as well as latest books and periodicals in commerce and economics. Library also subscribes to INFLIBNET N-List which provides access to 6000+ e-

journals and 1,64,3000+ e-books.

The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled, utilizing TATA Service (internet) with a bandwidth of 100 MBPS Fiber Cable Line (dedicated line). There are 10 routers installed throughout the campus. Each student and staff member are given their separate firewall access and can browse the internet facility using the college's Wi-Fi, for which BMCC has a predefined IT policy. It includes separate policies for staff members, students, research scholars, IT hardware, and IT software. The institute also has an ERP system 'Mastersoft' which looks after the admissions, exams (including entrance test) and administrative functions such as result declaration.

Institute also takes great care in its annual maintenance contracts which are renewed every year, while few of the procedures and policies are taken care at the central level by DES.

Student Support and Progression

The college has been ensuring students' progression since its inception and the scope to support students is ever increasing. The learners get financial scholarship from the government, institute, past students, and well-wishers which supports them in completing their education. The placement cell has been actively providing opportunities to increasing number of interested students. Internship / apprenticeship embedded education has been introduced recently. During the latest completed academic year 223 students were placed in various companies across sectors.

The active student council enables the students to participate in academic and administrative decision making which ensures a democratic environment on the campus. The Internal Complaints Committee, Anti-ragging Committee, and Grievance Redressal Cell allow students to raise their issues in offline and online mode which get solved easily with an inbuilt mechanism.

The Competitive Examination Cell arranges guest lectures on competitive exams, soft skills, ethics and morals, and also organizes workshops / seminars to prepare students for NET/SET exams, etc. This shapes their career and motivates them to go for higher studies. Students actively coordinate the events organized by the college. The college has a rich tradition of receiving awards. The registered Past Students' Association of the college provides monetary support to build infrastructure, academic guidance to the present students and apprise them with recent trends in industries and trade with their expertise in the field.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The governance of the college is motivated by the vision and mission of the parent institute. The administration is decentralized by delegating authority to various departments. A collective decision is taken through regularly conducted meetings between management, teaching and non-teaching staff. Thus the process is transparent and documented. The institute prepares perspective plan which focuses on the overall institutional development in various facilities, courses and infrastructure. The institute has a well-defined organizational structure for taking administrative, academic, financial and other decisions in consultation with the Governing Body. The duties and responsibilities of each fragment in the organizational structure is well planned. Implementation of e-governance in the areas of planning and development, administration, finance and accounts, student admission and support, and examination is done through the ERP system. The institute empowers its teaching and non-teaching staff through effective welfare measures, by providing financial support to attend various conferences, by subscription of professional bodies, by organizing development training programs, etc. Funds and grants

received from various non-government bodies and individuals are mobilized for optimum utilization in consultation with central purchase committee. The institute encourages digitization, thereby minimizing cash transactions. The transactions are audited by internal and external auditors regularly. IQAC plays a very prominent role in implementing the quality assurance strategies in teaching and learning processes. It includes taking corrective measures after procuring feedback and students satisfaction surveys. Based on demand from the industry and the student's new courses were launched in consultation with IQAC. IQAC also initiates the collaborations with other professional bodies for add on courses and co-curricular as well as extra-curricular activities.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has always braced itself more to keep up its core values and distinctiveness.

Gender sensitisation and women empowerment are implied by regular conduct of guest lectures, counselling sessions, Self-defence workshops and competitions. The awareness regarding 'Code of conduct' is generated during annual Induction programme.

Green initiatives are practiced by environment consciousness and conservation is accomplished by activities like maintaining solar energy plants at boys' hostel, biogas plant at girls' hostel, borewells, butterfly and medicinal plant garden, guests welcomed by Tulsi Plant, NSS camp's Haritwari, 'Nisarga poojan' on World environment day, planting of 75 trees on platinum jubilee and activities on 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle' are unique features. MOU between Nisarga foundation, USA's - The climate project foundation, New Delhi' and BMCC for solar energy and rainwater harvesting was signed. 'Green College Clean College' prize was received for the film on Sustainability.

Braille books, braille printer, audio books, JAWS software, SARA instrument, chess, cricket, counselling, availability of writers etc. is available for Divangjans, to provide a disabled-friendly environment.

Astitva and Troika are popular annual inter college events. Kisok – A Marketing Fest, is held annually that provides a practical learning platform for marketing specialisation students. Mile Sur Mera Tumhara- 'Cross Cultural Sensitisation activity' is conducted annually. Annual inter college Moot Court competition is held in the memory of Professor Chavan. National and international days, festivals are celebrated annually. 75th year of India's independence was celebrated with number of activities. Activities are conducted for promoting sports and defence.

Books donation, school wall-painting, Excel course for 2 credits was conducted at Velha satellite village. Disaster management camp, activities with NGOs, helping Tribals sell their products on campus, inviting underprivileged children during annual events are regular features. The campus was made available for Covid vaccination to staff as well as outsiders.

The parent institute was founded by teachers to provide affordable education to students. A separate Experiential Learning Board is established. 'D. G. Karve Research Chair' has been instituted for students and faculty research. The continuous efforts are made to promote Indian values and culture. 'Institutional Distinctiveness' is reflected through these features.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

BMCC strives to provide a rich curriculum that integrates themes like Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability and Professional Ethics across all degree programmes. This has helped us sensitize our students to these issues and help them develop a right perspective in this context. We believe that such an orientation, will make our students good citizens of the nation and the world which is in tune with our mission statement.

Human Values: At BMCC, we mould our students to be sensitive and value human values. At M.com level, students have a mandatory course on Human Rights for one credit which aims at helping each one examine and interrogate one's values, understand and value human rights and take responsibility for respecting, defending and promoting human rights. The Social outreach programmes in the college through various departments, offer the students a practical opportunity to showcase these values through their interaction with the marginalized. Multiple courses in the degree programmes discuss topics of human rights both with historical and current perspectives. Various activities in the college for physically challenged are focused on creating a truly inclusive environment on the campus.

A meditation programme in association with "Heartfulness" organization is conducted. Various activities that are conducted in these sessions, help students in increasing their self-awareness, managing stress, reducing negative emotions etc. It gives them an opportunity to derive emotional and physical benefits from the same.

Gender sensitization: A gender-neutral and safe environment is nurtured on the campus. Various activities in the college focus on gender dynamics and it is included and discussed in multiple courses offered at undergraduate and post graduate level. For instance, the college conducts self-defense workshops regularly. Lectures and workshops on POSH are organized to sensitize students on the same.

Women authors and their thoughts on wide ranging topics are introduced to the students. "Human Resource Management and Organizational Behavior", a course at M.Com includes topics like diversity management, cross cultural workforce and dealing with the same and so on.

Girls Empowerment Cell encourages students to appreciate women power in various fields through its varied activities.

Environmental Studies: Environmental studies is a compulsory course at second year for all programmes. This course develops a commitment on the part of the students towards conservation of environment. Various environment and sustainable practices are organized through the Nature's Club, NSS, NCC Heritage Collective departments. These practices promote healthy lifestyle, instill respect for nature and teaches them to be responsible towards environmental challenges.

Professional ethics: Business ethics is included as a course in BBA and BBA (IB) Program besides being part of the curriculum at B.Com and M.Com. It is also conducted as a value-added course through the Experiential Learning Board.

Awareness of **Cyber security** is of utmost importance today. This course is included in BBA(CA) and M.Com Programme. Students take up presentations and group discussion as activities under this course to create awareness of desirable ethical practices.

Thus BMCC has designed its curriculum to integrate all the cross cutting issues so as to make students as individuals that are competent, ethical, have compassion for all, are committed to striving for social justice, harmony, environmental sustainability and will care for the marginalized.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Students from varied socio-economic background and different geographic regions like almost all the states of India as well as abroad seek admission in the college. Rigorous efforts have been taken to design extra credit courses to cater the needs of all categories of the students. The emphasis is given on soft skills development in order to sharpen their employability.

We have established Rural Students' Development Department, Foreign Students Department and Students Welfare Board, and other several student associations considering the diversity of the students. We identify their learning requirements through their result analysis, mentoring sessions, induction programmes, daily class room interactions and their participation in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

We organize following activities for the students:

• For Advanced Learners:

Various initiatives are taken by all the faculty members for the all rounded growth of advanced learners so that they can achieve their aspirations and higher goals.

- We guide them to represent the college in various international, national, university and intercollegiate activities like Avishkar,
- We provide counseling to such students for advanced courses like CMA-USA, ACCA etc based on their 12th standard percentage at the time of first year admissions.
- Such students are encouraged to write research papers, participate into debate, quiz, poster making, business plan preparation. Advanced learners are given opportunities to organize various programmes, and play different roles like anchoring, introducing the guests, vote of thanks etc.
- Advanced learners also participate in library user group where extra books are issued to them.
- Advanced learners are identified in respective experiential learning departments. The concerned activity coordinator mentors these students. As a result, they show extraordinary performance in various events like RD Parade, Youth festivals, National camps, Sports at state, national and international levels.

• For Slow Learners:

We have considerably low percentage of slow learners because we conduct the admission process against pure merit. Cut-off point is always high. Nevertheless, there are some slow learners identified through classroom interaction, mentoring sessions, personal interaction with faculty members.

- We provide Remedial coaching under Students Welfare Board for providing extra guidance to the needy students.
- Rural Students Development Board and Department of English organize special guidance programmes for those students who are studied in vernacular language till the 12th standard and then they have shifted to English Medium.
- BBA CA department organizes bridge course for those who have shifted from Science background.
- Such students are provided with study material by the faculties.
- Along with advanced learners, these students are also given opportunities to participate in various programmes, to organize events where they learn from their seniors and peers.

One can notice the difference in the personality of the student as they enter last year of their degree in terms of communication skills, stage daring, decision making skills, problem solving abilities, leadership skills etc.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Aligning with the mission of empowering students materially, intellectually, and morally BMCC has undertaken various activities to enable students to unleash their fullest potential through the teaching learning pedagogy adopted in the classrooms and through various cocurricular and extension activities and equips students for life by providing deeper understanding of civic responsibilities and good citizenship. Autonomy has given the freedom to the learner and mentors to adopt various innovative teaching learning and evaluation methodologies for holistic development of students. It has been possible to integrate Indian

ethos and value systems through the addition of topics in the curriculum and implementation of the same through various classroom and beyond classroom activities through:

- Experiential Learning, where the focus is on concrete experience instead of abstract conceptualisation,
- Participative Learning-where the students are actively involved in the learning process and
- Problem Solving- where the students are thinking analytically, logically, and critically

Activities like virtual investments with actual prices, balance sheet handling, visits to the Reserve Bank of India and the Bombay Stock Exchange help students in subjects like Banking and Finance. B. Com students conduct surveys on digital banking and intern in banks to gain knowledge about their procedures and practices. Visits to local enterprises Chitale Bandhu Mithaiwale, Katraj Dairy, Dharavi slums of Mumbai, hotels like Hyatt, industries like Forbes Marshall, Diamond Factory, Seepz etc promote managerial and entrepreneurial insights. International visits to Dubai, Europe etc widened the vistas of learning and give them global exposure. Students are exposed to rural and modern formats of retailing like Sabji Mandis, Haats and Melas, Decathlon and Metro. Library Visits to understand the coding behind the library system, particularly by BBA (CA) students is worth mentioning. Activities promoting cross cultural sensitization and respect for diversity are also conducted on a regular basis. Tie -ups like Quick Heal for cyber awareness are immensely beneficial to BBA (CA) students. Distinguished Guest speakers and alumni from diverse fields- (Media, Finance, Services, Marketing, Human Resources, Environment Conservation, Arts- Music, Dance & Drama) help in bridging the gap between the classroom and the board room.

Participative classroom sessions bustling with group discussions, debates, roleplays, film appreciation, management games, business plans presentations, filing returns, book reviews, TED talks, interviews of local entrepreneurs and professionals provide a wholesome environment for the robust development of students.

The Final year projects for different streams are a culmination of the knowledge gained in the three years of college which help students to sharpen their analytical skills and creative acumen. Worth mentioning are the apps developed by BBA CA students. ICT has become an integral part of the teaching learning and evaluative process in BMCC, and teachers are also trained in the use and application of the infrastructure and tools of the same.

The ICT Tools available in BMCC for facilitation of learning includes 75 interactive panels, installed in each classroom with easy board software. These panels are also used as white boards and have wired connectivity to make the internet facility easily accessible to the faculties to supplement their academic content with websites or other related teaching learning resources.

Microsoft team's platform is available to deliver lectures in online mode and to facilitate sharing of learning material with the students. It also helps in organizing classroom activities like group discussion and quizzes and for presentations and assignments from the students. This platform is also useful in conducting webinars and guest lectures and facilitates effective alumni engagement. The platform proved very effective specially in Covid period wherein the students could participate in several cocurricular activities. It also helps in collecting feedback from time to time.

ERP system facilitates faculties and administrative staff to maintain a detailed profile of students including personal and academic details. It also helps in the examination process and continuous evaluation which is explained in the examination details in 2.5. It also provides an effective feedback mechanism for enhancement of the teaching learning and evaluation process.

The college has 6 well equipped computer laboratories with 300 computers where hands on learning and training can be effectively provided to the students as per the requirements of the curriculum. The students can utilize the facilities for their academic and research pursuits as well.

The college is a member of INFLIBNET and N-List where students can access digital collection of journals and articles for additional learning resources and for research purposes. We have online repository for the guest lectures conducted in the college for easy access by the students.

E-books and e-journals available in the library can be accessed by students at any time. EBSCO provides a wide range of articles and journals. BMCC has subscribed to CMIE's Prowess Interactive Querying Database for easy and reliable access to the financial data of almost 50000 listed and unlisted companies for analysis. Library is equipped with SARA (Scanning and Reading Appliances), JAWS (Job Access with Speech) for the visually challenged students of BMCC.

Adherence to the Academic calendar:

BMCC plans all the academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for the upcoming year and mentions them in the academic calendar for the year. The academic calendar is prepared and planned before the start of every educational year, by the IQAC of the college with inputs from the Vice Principals, HODs, and Controller of Examination. IQAC Co-ordinator calls for a meeting with all faculty members at the beginning of the academic year to discuss and decide the timeline of all processes in the institution namely admission, induction, and semester end examination, commencement of next semester, declaration of results, etc. Also days of national importance and flagship events of BMCC are mentioned in the academic calendar. After seeking approval from the Head of the institution it is then placed in the statutory bodies of the institution namely, CDC, Academic council, and Governing body for approval. It is then displayed on the website

The students can check the important dates well in advance and schedule their activities accordingly. The Academic calendar highlights the dates of Continuous Internal Assessments Semester End Exams (ESE), Backlog Exams, result declaration dates for FY/SY/TY students, vacation dates and public holidays.

Third-year students take various competitive exams such as CAT, UPSC and MPSC to be held during that academic year and sharing of the college calendar in advance helps them to plan their time to prepare for college exams as well as these competitive exams.

This is also helpful for outstation students and staff, who plan for their travel.

Adherence to Teaching Plans:

At the start of each semester, The Vice -Principal of the college conducts a meeting with the HODs for preparing the teaching plans. Month wise, the number of teaching days (excluding holidays and non-instructional days are calculated and communicated to the faculty members. Accordingly all the teaching faculty prepare teaching plans for their respective courses/subjects in consultation with the head of the department. Through department meetings at regular intervals, the HOD monitors the progress of the course as per the teaching plan .Continuous Internal assessment modalities may vary from one faculty to the other and the students are informed about the modality in advance. External Examinations for odd and even semesters are held in the months of October and March, respectively. Utmost care is taken by all teachers to complete the syllabus successfully, as per the teaching plan and the academic calendar. Various department activities are planned keeping in mind the academic calendar. Teaching plans help teachers prepare the lecture material at a pace that suits the learning needs.

The college uses an ERP System, that is 'MASTERSOFT' for the efficient functioning of examination procedures and processes including Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA).

The Exam procedure followed by the college is as follows

- Configuration of the exam in Software by the Exam Admin
- Then the online exam form for students is started.
- After the last date exam form, a late fee starts for those students who have not yet filled the form.
- After the exam form are filled the timetable is generated through Software
- After that Block allocation and students' attendance report is generated
- After that 'Exam Seat Number', and hall ticket for students is generated
- After the exam, the subject-wise student list is allocated to a teacher for answer sheet evaluation and mark entry is prepared.
- After the mark entry, all marks are locked from the faculty end and from the exam login as well and the result is processed
- CGPA is calculated and Ledger is generated,
- Once the ledger is generated it is checked and verified by the exam admin
- After ledger checking, Grade Card is generated, and the result is displayed on the student login
- After the result is declared, a timeline is given to the students for any internal evaluation discrepancies to be solved

The syllabus framing due to autonomy began in 2017 18 wherein teachers included writing objectives of the syllabus, the references of changed syllabus and course outcomes. The college received the draft of the course outcomes and program outcomes from NAAC before the pandemic and the groundwork for the same was initiated by the faculty members thereafter. Initially each subject had a differentiation in the number of course outcomes and thus to ensure parity across subjects, it was decided that there will be total 6 course outcomes for each course and 9 program outcomes for each program of the college. Once the program outcomes and course outcomes were drafted, they were shown to the experts for their suggestions and to the ERP team for technical assistance. Master soft, the official software service provider to the college, has designed a OBE module exclusively for CO PO mapping. The process of mapping begins with registering programmes and all the courses under each programmes in the OBE module. The next step is to create User Id and passwords of the Head of the institution as final authority, the Head of the Departments and of all the faculty members. The Courses are allotted to respective teachers by the Head of the Department. Discussions of all senior faculties and the head of the departments and head of the Institute are held to prepare Programme Outcome. Thereafter The Programme Outcome (PO) and the Programme Specific Outcome (PSO) are fed into the OBE system which is verified by the Head of the Department. This is followed by entering the Course Outcome (CO) by respective teachers after getting the approval from respective head of the departments. The OBE system automatically does the CO - PO mapping once the respective teacher identifies the relation between CO and PO to be, High, Moderate and Low, with numbers such as 3, 2, and 1 respectively assigned to the ERP system. Once the CO PO are mapped the student lists are fetched from the Academic ERP. The names of the students are available in excel template. Marks are entered in the template by teachers for each and every student from the answer sheets. Once the marks are entered in the excel template, the process of mapping is undertaken by the OBE system. The system generated CO and PO attainment report is finally made available. The Head of the Institution, the Principal and all Department Heads and IQAC verify the report and plan for corrective measures to improve the result.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

Main Building has ten classrooms and one computer lab. Eight of them are large enough to accommodate 120 students each and other two have a capacity of 50 students each. It also has the administrative office, examination centre and the staff room, along with the offices of Principal and Vice Principals.

Business Motivation, Training and Research Centre Building- has four computer laboratories, P. N. Gadgil Language Laboratory, Maitree Audio Visual Hall, Commerce Laboratory, Research Centre, IQAC and NAAC offices, Exam department, NCC Girls Office, the office of Past Students' Association and the Heritage collective office. Maitree Hall is used for soft skills development programmes, leadership training camp and guest lectures of industrial and professional experts.

BBA Building- has eighteen big sized classrooms with a seating capacity of 100 each and two medium sized classrooms with seating capacity of 30 each, one computer laboratory, one conference room and an administrative office of self-financed courses.

Shri Mukundas Lohia Academic Complex- is a 5 storied colossal building being constructed and is expected to be completed shortly for all the new courses being introduced in the academic year 2022-23. The 60,000 sq. ft building will house a well-equipped computer laboratory of 200 machines, a big auditorium with a seating capacity of 100 students, a big staffroom, 38 fully digitalised classrooms with smart boards, administrative offices, ladies common room, security room, a canteen and ample parking space.

Library Building- is a two storied building. It has two reading halls, the first one has a seating capacity of 60 whereas the second one has a capacity of 400. It also has the UGC Network Research Centre with 20 computers. One more lab with 6 computers is available for visually challenged students. Internet facility is also made available in this building.

Tata Assembly Hall- with a seating capacity of about 600, this hall is used for **inter-college competitions**, **workshops**, **conferences & social gatherings**.

Padma Vibhushan Dr. Cyrus Poonawalla Auditorium- is a medium sized, air-conditioned auditorium with a seating capacity of 160 students, equipped with modern acoustic and A.V facility.

Smt. Malanbai Doshi Hall- is a 1200 sq. ft common room facility for girl students.

Guest House- two rooms accommodating four beds adjacent to Malanbai Doshi ladies common room are available for visitors on the college campus.

Gymkhana Building - is near the main ground. Canteen, with a capacity of fifty students is also in this building.

Computer Labs- there are nine computer laboratories with 15 projectors. Computer laboratories are used in shifts by Junior college, Senior College, BBA, BBA IB, BBA (CA) and Post Graduate students to learn programming languages (JAVA, PHP, LINUX etc.), Tally, Office software and e-learning material. There is a separate language laboratory which offers certificate courses in German, French, Spanish etc.

Classrooms- The college has 37 classrooms spread across three buildings on the campus. Classrooms are allotted to teachers centrally by the timetable committee. All classrooms are well ventilated, spacious, LAN enabled and have interactive digital panel which supports the teaching-learning process effectively.

For extra curricular activities and sports/ outdoor games/ activities/ practices, BMCC has two big and spacious playgrounds including a basketball court. Various outdoor events and sports activities are regularly held on the main ground for example- cricket, football, hockey, volleyball, handball, softball, kabaddi, kho-kho, athletics and P.T. parades. The ground is also used for graceful parades and programmes of Independence Day and Republic Day.

There is a students' re-creation centre in the form of Pittie Hall. Many of the **indoor games facilities are** also available here for the students. For example, badminton, table tennis, carrom, chess, etc. Many of the cultural activity practices like dance and drama are regularly done here.

A gymnasium, yoga hall and gym facility are added attractions of the college. Gymkhana facilities for students are well maintained by the college and are regularly utilized by the students. Indoor game facilities for the students like table tennis, carrom, chess, etc are made available under gymkhana as and when required by the students.

The college has a predefined approved IT policy. The document is attached to it. College IT policy includes separate policies for staff members, students, research scholars, IT hardware, and IT software.

This policy applies to all the users in the DES, including temporary users, visitors with temporary access to services, and partners with limited or unlimited access time to services.

This IT Security Policy covers IT Assets, Password Control, Email, Internet, Antivirus, ERP systems, and CCTV. College IT policy consists of annual maintenance of hardware and software and up-gradation of hardware and software.

IT policy also consists of regular maintenance of CCTV cameras on the campus.

There is a committee of the Deccan Education Society that takes care of various facilities.

The College has purchased a Saphosh firewall that takes care of the entire net browsing control. The College has provided Wi-Fi facilities on the campus for students.

There are about 20 routers (core switches) installed throughout the campus. Each student and staff member is given their separate firewall access and their login ID and password. They can use the internet facility using the college's Wi-Fi.

There are 37 classrooms in the College and all are well equipped with interactive digital panel boards- and provide teaching-learning facilities to students. Each classroom is well equipped with Internet Connectivity to get ready for the information. The college has purchased the official version of Microsoft office 365 suite and has given licenses to all students and faculty members - by login in they can use tools provided by Microsoft. Also, during the pandemic, the college had never stopped providing education to students. It used Microsoft Teams meeting - as a learning tool for the students. The college has also used the Mastersoft learning management tool with its enterprise resource management system.

College in all has 9 computer labs. The biggest lab has 100 computers. Other labs have capacities of 25, 30, 15, 48 and 45 computers respectively. In addition to this the college also has a special UGC network centre in the library which has 20 computers made available for the students. Also, one small lab, with 6 computers well equipped with accessibility software is available for visually challenged students.

Brihan Maharashtra College of Commerce established under the Deccan Education Society has many of the maintenance procedures and policies being taken care at the central level by DES. All the annual maintenance contracts are in place and are renewed every year. Wherein, maintenance of classrooms, computers, computer labs, sports complex, library are regularly done. Along with this, Deccan Education Society also facilitates the annual maintenance contract for language lab, some specific equipment like xerox machine on campus, Wi-Fi connectivity and there are specific annual maintenance contracts which are entered into by college for library also. We have special library software which has AMC. We have separate library maintenance contract like anti-termite coating to the books and the shelfs as well as we have regular annual maintenance contracts for different requirements in library. For sports complex we have annual stock taking and their set up procedures for annual stock taking. All the sports equipment which are worn out or spoiled by the students are purchased again. We also have a regular classroom maintenance like polishing the benches, painting the classrooms, cleaning the classrooms and so on. DES has prescribed procedures and systems like inviting quotations, conducting comparative statement, holding negotiations with the vendors and then issuing the purchase order to them. This procedure is followed across DES in all its units.

For utilisation of in-house physical facilities, we have students booking register wherein the students already communicate the same to the respective heads and then sports facilities are given to them during those time slots. For library utilisation, we have special library users' group as well as there are various schemes which are set up with the help of library users group. There is also a facility and a system set up wherein the students can borrow the books for the entire year for their studies and at the end of the time period can return the same to the library. The computer laboratories are utilized as per the timetable. And hence the system for timetable framing is set up for computer laboratories. Besides that, if student want to use the computer laboratory separately, they can book the slots available after considering the regular timetable. They can book the lab timing with the help of computer lab in charge and utilize the lab accordingly.

The council should have the representation from NSS, NCC, Cultural Group, Student Development Board (Earn and Learn), six academic toppers from various programmes. The Principal of the college nominates two girl students to ensure gender equality. The representation of the weaker section of the society is adequately taken care of. Altogether the council consists of 10 to 12 elected members whereas, 20 to 25 students take part in voting.

In the previous year 2020-21, the role of the student council was limited to academics only as activities were not held on the campus due to the pandemic. Also since there were no instructions from the University during the lockdown, we continued with the General Secretary and the student's council of 2019-20 for 2020-21.

We have our student representation on the various Board of Studies, the Academic Council, Internal Quality Assurance Cell, Prevention of Sexual Harassment Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, and Gymkhana Committee of the College.

The provision in the act regarding student council was amended in the year 2017, which directed the educational institution to hold a general election to encourage the students' body to participate in leadership building and prepare themselves to play a vital role in nation-building. However since there were no further directives in this regard we continued with the existing university circular.

The procedure to form the student council begins by inviting forms from the interested students who are willing to file the self-nomination form to be a part of the students' council. Thereafter the forms are verified and shortlisted by the election committee. The approved students are called for a meeting where the election officer apprises them about their duties and rights as members of students' council. Further detailed guidelines regarding the election procedure are given to them. Once the election is held, either through consensus or actual voting, the general secretary and secretary of the council are declared elected by the election committee as the student representatives for the respective academic year.

Apart from the regular academic activities, each year BMCC student council has been regularly organising 'Traditional Day', 'Tie and Saree Day', and some other fun activities, such as, rangoli competition, sports activities, etc, except the pandemic years. Awards are given to the best dressed boy and girl. This helps them to socialize and refresh their minds. Students willingly agreed to celebrate the day this year without contributing to noise pollution so there was no DJ or Dhol Pathak on the campus.

Another highlight of BMCC in which the student council has been participating regularly is the Academic Prize Distribution ceremony. Barring the years of the pandemic, each year the event is organised with the active involvement of the student council.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 The governance of the institution is reflective of an effective leadership in tune with the vision and mission of the Institution

Response:

Deccan Education Society (DES), Pune was established in 1884 and registered on 13th August 1885 by four patriotic visionaries- Vishnu Shastri Chiplunkar, Lokmanya Bal Gangadhar Tilak, Gopal Ganesh Agarkar and Mahadeo Ballal Namjoshi.

• Vision Statement

Vision Statement is concurrent with the objective of the DES.

It is described as follows- "The object of the Deccan Education Society is to facilitate education by starting, affiliating or incorporating at different places, as, circumstances permit, schools and colleges under the private management or by any other ways best adapted to the wants of the people and provide the same at the affordable cost to all classes of the society at large."

• Mission Statement

The Mission Statement has been adopted by the college from the inaugural speech of the founder Principal Prof. D.G. Karve. The Mission Statement of the College is -

"To make a citizen of India as fully endowed materially, intellectually, and morally as the citizen of the most advanced country of the world is our collective aim. All activities connected with the college will be consciously correlated to this declared objective of Deccan Education Society".

The society believes that in order to achieve the vision and mission of the institution, teachers must be in an authoritative position and also be part of all decision-making committees. This is a legacy, diligently followed in the institution. It is achieved by selecting life members from among teachers, right from schools, colleges, and other institutes across DES. These life members are at the secretarial level in all committees. DES Council consists of equal number of life members and elected members. Elected members are reputed and influential people from the industry and society at large, for a span of five years. They support the life members to achieve the vision and mission of the institution. The governing body consist of life members and elected members. They are part of various committees for effective management and policy making for the institute. The post of the Chairman and Secretary of the committee is held by an elected member or a life member of DES Council.

The head of departments and representatives of administration staff under the guidance of the Principal, make a perspective plan for the college. This plan is then presented by the Principal to the College Development Committee and Governing Body. After approval, a strategy is readied by the head of departments in order to implement the perspective plan. Thus, faculties participate in making and achieving the perspective plan.

6.1.2 The effective leadership is reflected in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management.

Response:

Effective leadership is reflected through the various institutional practices and participative management ensuring making of good policy statement and implementing it through effective action plans. Principal and IQAC are involved in formulation of action plans.

CASE

Management and faculty at BMCC were always of the opinion that they had to upgrade the syllabus and give students a different experience in learning so that they enjoy the learning process and become better equipped for entering the industry. This was possible after getting autonomy. BMCC was granted the status of academic autonomy in the year 2017. Under this, an additional post of Vice- Principal was created to look after autonomy. Co-ordinator for each new course was appointed with the aim of effective conduction of the course. Credit system and extra credit courses were introduced to make the course industry aligned.

Academic: Autonomy gave the teachers the liberty and responsibility of designing new syllabus. For doing this task effectively, meetings were conducted, with representatives from the industry, SPPU & UGC nominee, academic experts, who guided the teachers for the same. Feedback from students already placed in the industry was also taken before syllabus making exercise commenced.

Statutory bodies like Board of Studies, Academic Council, Governing Body were formed. The syllabus framed by the faculty was reviewed by Board of Studies. This board constituted representatives from Pune University, experts from industry including experienced alumni, as well as eminent faculty. Their suggestions were incorporated and implemented.

Credit courses were introduced whose syllabus was overviewed by Experiential Learning Board. This gave an opportunity to students to learn about certain topic over and above the regular syllabus bringing them closer towards being industry ready. Earning five credits was made mandatory by the end of each program.

Examination: Board of Examination constituting of certain faculty members and administrative staff was

put in place to look over the examination process for all programs conducted in the college. Preparing question papers, conduction of semester end and backlog exams, paper correction under Central Assessment Program, etc. all processes are conducted under proper rules and regulations.

With the advent of Enterprise Resource Planning, all processes, right from admission to conduction of exam and generation of mark list, are digitised. Teachers were given training via workshops to enter the data regarding their subject and class, for online and offline teaching, sharing notes, and exam mark entry. The administration staff were trained for data and result generation. The head of department supervised the entire process.

The effective leadership provided or arranged for guidance, as required, from time to time. The work was decentralised, teaching and non-teaching staff participated whole heartedly in a structured way and the bigger picture was revealed when the first autonomy batch of BMCC stepped out with flying colours in 2020. The successful conduction of autonomy was possible because of division of work, authority and responsibility, discipline, unity of command, guidance and motivation of staff by the management. The underlying factor was the trust and mutual understanding among management and faculties.

Launching of New Degree Programs --

The following new courses were introduced in the period 2017-2022

1.B.Com (International Accounting and Finance)—

For better career opportunities in the field of International Accounting and Finance, BMCC has introduced this course in the academic year 2018-19 in collaboration with Association of Certified Charted Accountants ACCA, UK and International Skill Development Cooperation ISDC, UK. This is a 3-year UG course on completion of which, the students get an exemption in six papers while doing ACCA. It offers a professional standing while doing certificate course in IFRS exam and is recognized in 180+ countries, including India.

- 1.B.Com with Strategic Finance Considering the career opportunities in various sectors of strategic finance, BMCC has started a 3 year degree course B.Com. with 'Strategic Finance' in 2018-2019. In collaboration with Institute of Management Accountants IMA, US. This course is appropriate for accountants and financial professionals in business. After the course these students will be absorbed as senior accountant, cost accountant, internal auditor, budget analyst, financial analyst, finance manager, financial controller, treasurer, chief financial officer.
- 1.BMS Ecommerce Considering the growing importance of the logistic industry and the employment opportunities for skilled personnel', the National Skill Development Corporation of India NSDC and the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship MSDE has established the Logistics Skill Sector Council LSC. For developing skill of students, LSC has instituted a degree program in e-commerce operations. BMCC was selected to conduct this degree program in 2020-21. It has formally signed a MOU with BMCC for conducting the course. The students have to attend apprenticeship training for 300 days for which they will be getting a stipend.
- 1.B.Com Honors B.Com. (Hons.) Program has been launched from the academic year 2022-23. It is designed taking into the consideration demands of the students aiming to pursue job opportunities in various sectors like finance, management, taxation and professional courses. It enables the students to acquire knowledge, skills, abilities to analyse the contemporary realities pertaining to the domain of business. The program develops all graduate attributes.
- 1.B.Com Fintech In the current scenario engineers give the required technical support, but they lack the knowledge of finance, accounting, and investment. This creates a niche market for the commerce and management students with technological background. For satisfying demands of the industry, commerce, management and fintech must be combined. In the three-year degree program introduced by BMCC in 2022-23. The students will learn about cryptocurrencies and new-age digital currency concepts and data analytics applications.
- 1.B.Voc The new 'National Education Policy' is focused on developing vocational skills. One of the mandates is to develop National Occupational Standards NOSs for various job roles in their respective industries. For creating employment-oriented courses and empowering innovative activities in students and also for launching multi- disciplinary courses in BMCC. B.Voc, a UGC approved graduation course was introduced in the year 2022-23. The training through this course will be the benchmark for the Film-TV-Theatre Industry.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response:

Governing Body of Deccan Education society acts as guiding authority for the college. At the helm of college administration is Governing Body (GB) of BMCC. Under the GB are Academic Council and Finance Committee. The Estate Department and Human Resource Department reports to College Development Committee CDC. Day to day administration under the Principal and IQAC also works in coordination with the CDC. CDC works with the GB-BMCC and handles all financial matters related to Estate Committee, Human Resource Committee and Examination Committee.

IQAC provides general guidelines for a conducive environment suitable for teaching-learning process. The Academic Council along with IQAC members, monitors all mechanisms of academic and administrative processes. The Principal, Vice-Principal, IQAC and Academic Council are involved in formulating and communicating the policies and action plans to all the stakeholders. The faculty are involved in academic decision-making process through the various Departmental Committees. The college management has empowered Vice Principals and Head of the Departments with adequate autonomy. The IQAC ensures that the quality standards and benchmarks are achieved effectively.

Principal is the head of the institution under whom various Statutory and Non-Statutory Committees are formed as per UGC guidelines. It includes Grievance cell, Anti ragging cell, Internal compliance committee and Ombudsman cell.

The Administrative committees (monitoring the code of conduct) like Accounts and Finance, Students administration and ERP function under the Principal's leadership and is routed through the Vice Principal and a code of conduct is explicitly stated in a handbook.

Finance Committee facilitates preparation of budget estimates and allocation of grants received from UGC, State Government, income from fees, amounts collected for various activities etc. The budget is approved by the CDC, GB-BMCC and forwarded to GB-DES for effective financial decision making.

Board of Studies approves the syllabi prepared by forum of head of departments along with faculty, keeping in view the PO's and CO's of the curriculum. Suggestions from experts, academicians, student representatives are considered. It also suggests methodologies for teaching and evaluation, for relevant reference material, topics for seminars and coordinates with the Examination Department. The Board of Studies is supervised by the Academic Council.

Community engagement activities mandated by the University such as NCC and NSS are handled by their

respective committees under the guidance of the Principal. Students participate whole heartedly in these activities and contribute towards society engagement, building values in the process.

For building the career of students, a separate Placement Officer has been appointed. The officer establishes a good rapport with the industry, invites them for interaction with students there by enabling them to get a better exposure to industry requirements.

To promote quality research in the field of commerce, a Research Cell has been instituted. Various eminent and approved research guides are associated with the Research Cell. Every year many research students, are awarded the degrees like M.Phil. (discontinued since 2019-2020) PhD. Faculties are given the opportunity to present their research proposal which if approved can be funded under the Prin. D.G.Karve Chair, instituted by the college.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/ progression

Response:

Teaching staff -

- Interactions with industrial experts and academicians in various fields were arranged As the college entered autonomy in 2017-18, various experts were invited to guide the teachers for framing the syllabus.
- **Resource sharing** Resources were shared by way of Inter library loan facility with Fergusson College, Gokhale Institute, Jaikar Library, and SPPU, during pre-pandemic time. Faculty members were encouraged and sponsored to attend faculty development programmes, orientation programmes, workshops, and seminars. Achievers are awarded by the college.
- **E -books** E -books / journals were made available to faculty members and students which proved to be very helpful since the pandemic.
- **Funds for research project** Funds are granted under Prof. D G Karve Research Chair, named after founding principal of BMCC. Funds are allotted to selected research proposals which encourages our teaching staff for doing eminent research.
- **Deployment of laptops to full-time teachers** Laptops were given to fulltime faculties which was very helpful specially during the pandemic.
- **Medical insurance** Medical insurance facility is provided to the fulltime faculties, the premium of which is borne by the society. Insurance cards are issued to teachers. Under this, medical reimbursements were claimed. The facility of yearly medical check-ups is available.
- **DES Credit society** DES Credit society provides loans at a lower rate to beneficiaries.
- Online Teaching During the pandemic, Microsoft Teams ID were created, and training was imparted to all teachers. As a result of this teachers became tech savvy and could conduct online classes smoothly.
- **Blended Teaching** Interactive panels were installed in each classroom. Training sessions were conducted for teachers. So, when situation of the pandemic got slightly better classes could be conducted in blended mode which proved beneficial for both local as well as out station students.
- Global Immersion Program Under the Global Immersion Program faculties and students have visited universities, manufacturing companies, and financial markets of many foreign countries.

Non-teaching staff -

- The facility of festival advance against salary, is available for the non-teaching staff.
- To inculcate oneness among the staff and their family, BMCC arranges "Family Day" in which wards of teaching and non-teaching staff are felicitated for their achievements during the year.
- A week is designated for indoor games and outdoor games, for the non-teaching staff.
- Seminars, webinars, and workshops are arranged for non-teaching staff in which participation is in full strength.
- As the college is getting digitized, non-teaching staff were given training.
- Medical insurance facility is provided to the non-teaching staff and premium of which is borne by the society. Insurance cards are issued. Under this, medical reimbursements were claimed.

Accommodation for selected teaching and non-teaching staff is made available on the campus. Retiring teaching and non-teaching staff are felicitated with gratitude during their retirement program. Different programs are arranged every year by the staff academy for the benefit of the staff members. Through these programs guidance is given to the faculties and non-teaching staff.

Society. Accountant General's Office audits the accounts of college. Internal audit programmes are undertaken through Chartered Accountants appointed by the Finance Department in the Central Office of the parent institution. Monthly report of the accounts is submitted to the parent body for perusal.

The last internal audit was done in the month of June, 2021. The institution has inbuilt mechanism to perform timely checks on the expenditure made through college funds as well as through various funding schemes.

The queries and objections which are raised by the auditors have been duly resolved by the accounts department. After resolving the queries, the rectification report is reverted to the Chartered Accountant.

Apart from this, there is Planning and Implementation Group of each scheme like the Continuing Professional Education CPE which is funded under UGC. Regular meetings of these groups help in reviewing the status of expenditure under each budget head as sanctioned. Fund allotment and disbursement through schemes is regularly checked and recommended to the accounts office by the Principal. Timely submission of the audited statement of expenditure, utilization certificate, certificate of assets acquired, purchase of library books and journals is executed well within the time framework and submitted to the funding agency.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

BMCC was established in 1943, in Pune by the Deccan Education Society. Due to its legacy and goodwill, funds in form of endowment and donations are received from well-wishers, parents, ex- students, and teachers. These funds are mobilised at society level as well as college level.

Since 2017-18 following steps were taken as regards institutionalizing the autonomous status:

- In August 2017 -18 autonomy was granted by the UGC. We initiated the autonomy with first year of every degree program with natural progression to second and third year
- Statutory bodies like the College Development Committee, Academic Council and Governing Body of BMCC were constituted. Meetings of these bodies are conducted regularly.
- Five Boards of Studies viz. 1) Business Studies, 2) Accountancy, Law and Taxation 3) Economics and Banking, 4) Languages 5) Mathematics Statistics and Computer Application were constituted.
- Controller of Examinations (COE) was appointed.
- Credit structure was enhanced from 120 credits (for grantable) and 127 credits (for self-finance) to 132 credits. In 2019-20, credit structure was upgraded to 132 credits wherein 5 credits are to be earned from the experiential learning board.
- In 2018-19 value added courses under Experiential Learning were launched. A separate BOS for this was formed. More than 20 courses have been offered to the students through this board.
- Activities like NSS, NCC, Nature club, Heritage Collective, Cultural, Student Development, Moot Court Association, Girl's Empowerment Cell, Sports were brought under this board and appropriate credits have been allotted for the same.
- Examination pattern was decided as internal 40 marks and external 60 marks for Under Graduate Programmes and internal 50 marks and external 50 marks for post graduate programmes.
- Faculty members have full autonomy as regards the implementation of the internal evaluation.
- Innovative teaching-learning methodologies are used by faculty members.
- Degree programs in collaboration with national / international institutions were launched.

Till date three consecutive batches of all degree programs have passed out successfully.

CASE II

Upgradation of IT infrastructure

To keep pace with the changing learning paradigms and to encourage the usage of educational technology, the IQAC focused on upgradation of classroom/lab infrastructure.

- IT infrastructure has been upgraded extensively. All classrooms and seminar halls in BMCC have **Intellectual Interactive Panels (IIPs)**. There are 9 Computer Labs on campus with different capacity ranging from 10 computers to 200 computers. A separate lab of 100 computers is set up. Students visit these labs in batches regularly.
- Old boards (black/ green/white) were replaced with IIPs
- Computers and computer programmes were upgraded. Two new computer labs were set up. A new lab of 200 computers is being set up in the Mukunddaas Lohia Academic Complex shortly.
- Laptops, Desktops IP Phones, Echo cancellers, Cameras, Printers, Projectors also have been purchased. BMCC has a modern and advanced IT infrastructure.
- Database like Prowess is purchased for the benefit of student/faculty research
- Wi-Fi facility on campus has been made available.

Case 1

Structured feedback on teachers and teaching –learning process.

In the third cycle of NAAC, it was recommended that we strengthen formal feedback from students for quality improvement in teaching-learning.

Regular feedback from the students is taken about teachers, syllabus as well as on the teaching learning process and general facilities available on campus through the ERP (Master soft). The data is analyzed and made available to individual teachers through their log in. The IQAC coordinator can access all feedback. The analyzed data is made available on the website of the institution.

Also, departments are provided with the statistical data of class performance in each course and trends are discussed with the department by the Principal. As batches differ from year to year, this exercise is a helpful indicator of the difficulty level that the class can handle and also helps the faculty customize the teaching-learning-evaluation approach for the batch in the following semesters

Similarly, **Student Satisfaction Survey** is conducted since 2019-20 every year. Initially a small percentage of students participated in the process. So from the next academic year teachers advised the students on the need to give the feedback and then onwards there has been a rise in the number of students giving feedback. It is available on the website.

CASE 2

Institutional ERP - GEMS (2017 – 2020) ERP (Mastersoft) has been purchased by the institution. Mastersoft organizes regular workshop /training programs to support teaching- learning process and incorporate ICT enabled techniques to the maximum extent possible. The following areas are covered under ERP –

Teachers profile is available on ERP and linking to Biometric attendance system is in process. Leave management and HR management is integrated with the ERP and Library management system of Mastersoft is used successfully.

The process of application for student admission, proctored entrance examination, display of merit list on the website, admission process, payment of fees and issuing of ID cards, generation of hall tickets, conduction of examinations in MCQs and descriptive format and mark entry (internal and external) for the generation of mark sheets are conducted through the ERP.

Management and conduction of extra credit courses is done completely through the ERP. The extra credits earned are also reflected on the academic year end mark sheet.

Mastersoft ERP also has an OBE platform wherein mapping of POs and COs can be done. Training for this mapping activity is in process. Student feedback is taken through ERP and analysis is also available.

Provision for maintaining attendance, updating timetable, sharing syllabus, teaching plans and e-library, providing lecture notes, question bank, online continuous assessment test and test tracking is available on the ERP.

The composting unit is installed for organic waste generated in college campus. Earlier practice was open dumping and handing it over to Swachh/ Pune Municipal Corporation. With the help of *Poornam Eco vision*, the college operates and maintains composting plant. Composting is a method which involves degradation of organic matter to convert into compost.

Under Waste Composition, Garden Waste: 10 kg/day and Wet waste: 5 + 5 kg/day at boys and girls hostel is done.

Deployment of labour for processing at plant for one hour, Supervision at regular frequency (once in seven days), Culture preparation (required for composting) and maintenance for compost process is done by

Poornam Ecovision Foundation. The college provides modification in pits and space for organic waste management plant. It collects and looks after the transport of segregated organic waste to doorstep of wet and garden waste composting project.

The output is 4 kg per day i.e. 1460 kg of compost generated annually. The attempt is to provide holistic solutions in a view of environment conservation and awareness to develop better and environment friendly practices to manage the waste.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

1. Title of the Practice

Mile Sur Mera Tumhara [Cross Cultural Sensitization Activity]

2. Objectives of the Practice

Both education and culture are shaped by time. So, in this globalized atmosphere, a key challenge for education is to develop individuals with cross-cultural competence. Hence, the primary objective of this practice is to prepare students as intercultural competent workforce for future. This activity is conducted to sensitize the students about diverse cultures. It focuses on increasing the student awareness and knowledge about cultures other than their own, along with the development of teamwork, leadership, and creativity skills. Its purpose is to steer the learners towards becoming tolerant, inclusive, and interested in understanding other cultures.

3. The Context Conceptual Framework:

- Ethnic and cultural diversity has increased significantly at workplaces as well as educational institutions over the years due to growth of global business, technology, and social media.
- Intercultural competence is necessary for harmonious relationships, effective work practice and successful career.
- Not only intercultural competence but teamwork, creativity and leadership skills are also indispensable life skills for success and accomplishment in professional life.
- New and more effective pedagogy for teaching these life skills is necessary for engaging all the learners and making teaching-learning process effective and at the same time enjoyable.

The challenge was the implementation of the same in a formal setting and the involvement of large number of students in the workshop. No challenges were experienced in convincing the students of the learning pedagogy or the objectives of the same.

4. The Practice

All 650 students of SY B. Com are asked to form teams of 10 members each, across all five divisions they are associated with. They are asked to select their team members and then they were given ten days to plan their presentation/performance. The presentation/performance includes depicting the culture of any one region, state or country in any form and in any manner. They are expected to do so through food, dresses, festivals, rituals, traditions, dances, songs, languages etc. Each team has to present the same in a time slot of ten minutes. They are also instructed to observe the other groups and get an understanding of what they are representing. They are then evaluated based on presentation and other life skills.

The practice is linked to achieving the POs of the institution and to stimulate holistic development of the students with awareness of our rich diversity and significance of Indian ethos and principles. Education should be an enjoyable learning experience, and that is the main objective behind this activity. It also encourages research on other topics by the students and working in teams as contrasting to working individually or only with their own class peers, thus paving some seeds of multidisciplinary learning. It offers scope for creativity and presentation in different aspects and the same time instils a sense of respect and tolerance for other languages, food, and festivals creating the concept of harmony and unity in diversity. Self-learning and peer learning were also the objectives of this activity which is also what is envisioned in the National Education Policy

5. Evidence of Success

The evidence of success is in the fact that almost all students participated in activity whole heartedly and presented their concepts beyond the stereotype expectation. Use of the different aspects of culture beyond language make the whole learning experience really stimulating. Another interesting outcome was the fact that students deliberately chose to represent other states rather than their own state, took efforts to understand the aspects of culture in that state and present the same which itself is a yardstick of success of the activity. Differently abled students, who normally hesitate much peer interaction also participated with a lot of enthusiasm and peer dynamics which also proved to be a good learning experiment to promote DEI. Discontentment of the senior students of not being able to engage in this kind of learning experience due to Covid pandemic speaks also about the success of this practice. Basically, the results indicate, that a little creativity on part of the educators and the learners can create good learning experiences, beyond

classroom teaching. It's important to give that kind of freedom and support to the learners to choose their learning activity. Group activities and peer learning are more stimulating and can be more exciting and engaging rather than individual assignments for evaluation of students' life skills.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Since the college has a big hall, implementation of the same in a good infrastructure facility was not an issue. The only problem faced was the change of dates by the students which led to more students presenting on the second day rather than the first day. Resources needed were minimal as the same was facilitated by the students themselves, but the college could maybe support financially some aspects of the same. Capturing the whole activity through AV was the biggest challenge due to the overwhelming excitement and response of the students on the workshop day.

Creating such enjoyable learning experiences at the educational institute stimulates all students irrespective of their individual bias, inhibitions, and cultures to engage and participate in the learning process, which paves the path for DEI and creates more sensitive and tolerant global citizens.

1. Title of the practice:

Late Shri. Vijay A. Chavan Memorial Lecture and National Moot Court Competition

Every year, Brihan Maharashtra College of Commerce, Pune conducts a Memorial Lecture and National Moot Court Competition in the memory of Late Shri. Vijay A. Chavan, Assistant Professor of our prestigious college.

2. Objectives of the Practice

Moot court is an imitation of an actual courtroom. It mirrors real- life courtroom proceedings with the purpose of creating an understanding of the operation and functioning of courts for law students. Professor Vijay A.Chavan initiated this practice in our college as a classroom activity intending to lay foundation for commerce students to gain knowledge, understanding and skills of mooting. Late Shri Vijay A Chavan national moot court requires students to draft memorials, argue and defend their respective hypothetical cases by undertaking research and engage with the opposite team. This helps students to hone their drafting, research and argumentation skills as well as experience the adjudicatory process of a court/tribunal. The competition aims at enhancing critical thinking, problem-solving ability, cultivate advocacy and communication skills along with exposing students to the nuances of court.

3. The Context

Our moot court society starts the groundwork and planning for the competition few months in advance. First and foremost work is started on the preparation of a well designed and articulated moot proposition by a well experienced and practicing lawyer. The moot proposition is designed keeping in mind the interesting current occurrences happening around us so as to gain maximum attention and interest for the competition. In the mean time a group of volunteers tasked with various responsibilities is assembled. Once the moot proposition and rules are formulated a date is set and invitations to law and commerce colleges are sent out. With the advent of the pandemic, the challenges have increased tenfold. Organization

and clear communication of dates, rules and details are of utmost importance. Since the commerce students are completely new to such a practice various training and doubt clearing orientations are conducted to guide and train them. As the date of competition approaches the team is on their feet collecting memorials, coordinating with teams, drawing lots, assisting teams with their doubts, handling technical problems, documenting and perfecting details, preparing for courtrooms and most importantly keeping calm and enjoying the process. On the main day of the competition the challenge faced is to make sure to manage time efficiently, handle any mishaps coming the way, maintaining accuracy and leaving no room for error.

4. The Practice

In a moot court competition, there are two sides namely appellant and respondent represented by two speakers and a researcher. A hypothetical case is to be argued in front of a panel of judges following the decorum and regulations of a court. The teams are required to prepare well researched written memorials submitted before the panel. Each team gets an opportunity to argue from both sides and are subjected to questioning by the judges. The appellant teams are given the opportunity to rebut the defendants. Every court master keeps a note of the timings and intervenes to keep the court proceedings time bound. Participants are required to research thoroughly and present their arguments based on adequately applicable laws. This practice strengthens confidence, communication, team work, networking, research and written skills and most importantly gives a practical experience as compared to theoretical knowledge. With context to Indian education, mooting is an excellent practice for students of commerce and law. The skills and abilities polished by this activity helps students in all walks of lives and puts them among the best in the world. Mooting is such an essential asset to the educational system that will help not only law students but students of any background. Students will be well equipped to the basic understanding of legal technicalities and motivate them to take up roles of significance in our legal system. India needs not only efficient advocates, judges and practitioners but also individuals willing to work relentlessly and selflessly in upholding the legal force of our nation. However, mooting is easier said than done. It can look more fun on the surface but can be extremely daunting for some students. There have been experiences where students get disheartened and discouraged after been grilled by judges. Also several times fear of failing or not being able to fulfil expectations don't allow many to even try. The key is to not lose courage and faith. Students need to take every failure as an opportunity and every obstacle as a learning lesson. With proper guidance, support and help students will be more encouraged to try and excel especially students of nonlaw background. Our competition is an endeavour to motivate and interest as many possible commerce students to be young budding lawyers and individuals well aware of the Indian legal system.

5. Evidence of Success

2021-22 marked the 6th edition of the competition. As against our target of getting at least 25 teams, 32 participating teams came from law colleges across states like West Bengal, Karnataka, Chattisgarh, Assam, Tamil Nadu, Rajasthan, Punjab, Delhi and 10 teams were from Commerce Colleges. Our Competition gave a wide exposure to the participants since every team came from a different state and even from the prestigious National Law Universities, to showcase their unique set of legal skills. We received feedbacks from some of the law college teams who were in awe of the way the competition was conducted so seamlessly, something unusual for a commerce college. Our main objective is to encourage students from commerce colleges to learn the art of mooting and their teams make full utilisation of the opportunity they get to understand to nuances of court system in India and by the end of the competition they are able to think and analyse like an advocate. Our Competition was adjudged by reputable advocates, High Court and Supreme Court judges who praised the critical and analytical reasoning skills of the speakers. Overall, the competition was a successful endeavour. Our team rigorously worked for a period of 3.5 months. On the

competition day, from Court room sessions to food arrangements to computation of marks to declaration of results, everything was managed duly and nobody was left dissatisfied. Recently, we have also formed a Moot Court Society exclusively for Commerce Colleges. This is a platform to collaborate and conduct various activities like discussion on case laws, interactions, seminars, etc. We are set to become a pioneer in this adventure.

6. Problems encountered and resources required:

Since the entire competition was conducted through an online mode, there were some minor technical challenges like mails were not reaching on time so we had to use WhatsApp as another mode of communication. Draw of Lots had to be revised because three teams from law colleges backed out a day before the competition due to their lack of preparation, we had already arranged for a dummy team so we did not face any trouble. Every year, we are assisted by the students of Shri Navalmal Firodia Law College. They conduct training workshops for our participants and guide us about the conduct of the competition. Even though the competition is online, our team has to work physically from the campus where we divide the various labs into court rooms and perform the role of Court Masters. Headsets, Desktops, Log in IDs are provided by the technical team from our college. This year, our team consisted of 50 volunteers led by our faculty- incharge, Dr. Varsha Deshpande and Dr. Pratap Salunke who worked closely with us and provided continual guidance and encouragement.
